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#### 1. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Students are introduced to paint as a medium for self expression. The fundamental components of painting (drawing, color, composition, and content/subject matter) are explored through in-class and outside projects, each designed to build knowledge and facility. Various painting techniques are introduced as this knowledge is applied to painting assignments.

#### 2. COURSE OBJECTIVES

- a) Content
  - Establish a working knowledge of the fundamentals of painting
  - Develop a healthy disposition toward self expression (including that of others)
  - Refine aesthetic sensibilities through experience and analysis
- b) Core Competencies
  - Critical and Creative Thinking
  - Communication Visual, Written, and Oral
  - Personal, Moral, Social, and Cultural Development
  - Technology and Information Management

## 3. COURSE MATERIALS

- a) Required Text: None.
- b) Holy Cross College's online course management system, Moodle (<a href="http://moodle.hcc-nd.edu">http://moodle.hcc-nd.edu</a>) is an important resource for this class. Course materials and assignments will be posted there, as announced.

## 4. CLASS FORMAT

Through lectures, demonstrations, and assignments students will be introduced to and gain facility with core concepts. Concepts covered in the first half of the course include color theory, transforming color, and exploring the boundaries of the assigned palette. The second half centers on painting techniques and experimentation. This is primarily a studio course; wear proper work attire.

## 5. CLASS POLICIES

#### **Attendance Policy**

It is very important to get to class each day and to be on time. Three (3) instances of tardiness are equivalent to one (1) absence. Students with three (3) unexcused absences will have their grade reduced by one letter grade (e.g., an A becomes a B, a B- becomes a C-, etc.). Students with five (5) absences will fail the course, without exception.

In the event of an excused absence (e.g. with documentation from a doctor stating that you were ill) that falls on an exam day, you will be allowed to make up the exam without penalty. #### 6. GRADING CRITERIA

Assignments (delineated in the Course Calendar and on Moodle) are evaluated using the grade scale at right and the rubric below. Overall, critiques and exams are equally weighted, but evaluation criteria for individual assignments may be differently weighted where appropriate (e.g., compositional quality is assigned a weight of zero (0) when evaluating the execution of the color wheel).

**Originality** - Does the solution benefit from risk-taking and experimentation? Is it a novel or original solution?

1-6 displays lack of originality, solution may be underdeveloped or trite

7-8 displays competency in use of creative thinking skills

9-10 exceptionally original, creative thinking at a professional level

**Compositional Quality** - Does the solution demonstrate advanced understanding/application of principles and elements? Are they used conceptually?

- 1-6 displays lack of unity, poor compositional use of space, elements are not used in accordance with principles of visual organization
- 7-8 displays competency in use of elements and principles to create space and unity
- 9-10 excellent composition, professional quality composition

**Craftsmanship** - Is the execution of the solution high quality?

- 1-6 displays poor craftsmanship or a lack of care in execution
- 7-8 displays competency in the use of materials to solve the problem
- 9-10 excellent craftsmanship, professional quality work

**Effort/Concept Development** - Demonstrated commitment to excellence in course of assignment; attempted to fully explore problem and solution.

- 1-6 displays lack of understanding, incomplete or poor concept development
- 7-8 displays competency in concept development
- 9-10 concept is extremely well developed, approaches professional standards

**Other Considerations** - In the course of the assignment, did the individual demonstrate receptivity and critical thinking skills? Was the assignment completed according to the project guidelines? During lectures preparatory to the assignment, was the individual prepared for discussion?

- 1-6 displays lack of openness to constructive input from classmates and/or instructor, poor analysis or preparedness
- 7-8 adequately prepared; displays competency in the use of critical thinking; is open to constructive input from classmates and/or instructor
- 9-10 excellent participation and preparedness; professional attitude
